2020 Annual Report Celebrating the Joy of Giving

2020 will long be remembered as the year of the pandemic, the year of Covid to be more specific. Our year began with the usual burst of energy and enthusiasm which typically occurs in January. By late February we shared the anxiety of the rest of the world as the seriousness of this virus emerged and as it touched our community. In March we closed our campus but emphasized while we were closing a geographical space including our lovely sanctuary, we were not closing our church!

The articles in this Annual Report illustrate how our own set of heroes—staff and volunteers creatively continued the work of the church while coping with the challenges produced by this virus. Their leadership ensured God's love and concern for others was centered in our church activities, programs and through our mission outreach to the community.



As an example, in June the Session appointed a "Reopening Committee" chaired by Amy Woolwine which worked tirelessly to develop a plan to reopen the campus in the fall. With an emphasis on following the science, the plan included 20 specially trained volunteer ushers. It was to be implemented in the fall but a spike in Covid prevented this reopening. When appropriate, this plan will be launched in 2021.

Our annual gifts and pledges including those from the budget of the Presbyterian Women were a significant commitment to Christ's teaching to love and serve our neighbors as ourselves. Gifts and grants were made possible for non-profits, schools, individuals and other worthy groups throughout the community. The significant impact of estate gifts to our First Presbyterian Church Foundation continued to positively affect our annual budget.

During 2020, it was evident that our church family, while separated from one another physically, remained connected spiritually through our love of God and knowledge that He is always with us!

Worship & Music Committee RESPONDS TO COVID

Carol Hovey, Moderator of the Worship & Music Committee, shared how worship continued throughout 2020, though in a different format!

- When in-person gatherings were prohibited by the North Carolina pandemic guidelines in March 2020, we closed our Sanctuary for worship and also postponed alternate worship services such as a jazz vesper service being planned by Margaret Irvin. Many worship-related celebrations quickly became "drive-through" events including the Flowered Cross Service.
- Our immediate challenge was to quickly create a virtual on-line worship service that could be accessed through a YouTube page. We experimented with finding the best approach to deliver sermons from our ministers' homes while, at the same time, inserting our much-loved music ministry throughout the service. - Our solution was to order and install new audio and video equipment and train members to video tape worship services. We thank Hunter Morrison and his team of trained technology wizards for making this happen! Our updated technology resulted in the congregation being able to pledge and give online to include texting our offerings



Hunter Morrision videos worship service. to the church! Dave Sheridan, Worship Committee member said, "Our progress in the technology world has leaped well ahead of what we might have anticipated if we were not pushed into this by the confines of the virus."

- A congregational survey was conducted to gather ideas on making our services more meaningful and how to increase connections during the pandemic while we were not "in person." The 126 respondents indicated they desired to have a "mix" of worship services to include both formal and informal offerings and that most members were reading the Banner. Susan Smith, Worship Committee member said, "We have worked in harmony with staff and other committees to ensure that our members continue to have meaningful experiences through alternative services."
- Lay Readers were invited to participate in the worship services via video—it was wonderful to "see" members of our church family again. Susan Otteni, Worship Committee member said, "We are so grateful to Director of Music and Organist Jacquie Yost for volunteering to tape these people. She really went above and beyond her traditional role to help our church feel connected."
- Information normally included in our printed bulletins was included on the video at the end of the service. This addition which started in the fall was appreciated by so many. "Thanks" to Church Administrator Suzanne Russell for preparing this part of the service.

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Music Ministry

Jacquie Yost, Director of Music Ministry & Organist, created a thought-provoking word picture of the effects of the pandemic on the Music Ministry during 2020 and beyond. The following excerpts are from Jacquie's reflections.

Before the pandemic, worship in our church came in one form: in-person, in one location, and in one time. Yet, these now coveted traits of in-person worship had other less controlled attributes. Whom might you see in worship? What might an eager child say during the children's sermon? Indeed, these elements of "chance" and "spontaneity" would now ironically be welcomed guests in the virtual world into which we have acclimated. But perhaps as we move into a post-pandemic world, we may consider the benefits of what virtual worship has offered us in mitigating the less-desirable effects of social distancing and isolation.

First, virtual worship allows for its viewers to worship at any time. Others whose lives are bombarded by virtual education for their children and the stresses therein of working at home with their children have said how "binge-worthy" our services are once the children have gone to bed. Our Joy Gift and Taylor Glen musical concerts provided an oasis for so many and can still be viewed on our YouTube website.

Virtual worship also allowed for our members to see other venues like readers' homes and even the organ console. One member commented how she had never been up to the organ loft and had never seen how an organ worked!

The editing of not only different camera angles of our musicians and choir members but merging other images and art within our musical offerings truly add another dimension to worship like we have never experienced. Our musical presentations slowly began to insert "text" of our anthems on the screen in time with the music. Not only did this allow for a quick understanding of the anthems and its relationship with the sermon, but for participation and community!

But what has truly made all of this happen has been the unwavering and devoted efforts of the Sanctuary Choir to make music for our congregation in witness to God's

faithfulness and never-failing love. The lengthy recording sessions to maximize everyone's presence at that very time to achieve the greatest number of anthems for the following weeks were not easy. It was difficult not to hug each other during these sessions!

Our entire Christmas repertoire was recorded within eight days before Thanksgiving! Jeffrey Price and I were afraid that a spike in Covid numbers after Thanksgiving might eliminate another opportunity for recording music for Christmas. Although the vocal and mental fatigue acquired from recording this amount of repertoire in one sitting can be draining, we did it, and with excellent results and reception!

And last, but certainly not least, **the music** at FPC through its recorded and instantly available means through our website **has also provided a much-needed source of comfort for those in our congregation and community** undergoing grief and loss during this time of isolation.

Virtual worship and its peripheral benefits are still improving and may provide even more opportunities for mission and outreach as we venture into 2021.

Christian Formation in the midst of a pandemic

BEFORE THE PANDEMIC

2020 marked the beginning of a new decade and our church year began with interesting areas of study and exciting church events scheduled.

Prayer Study Launched in January - Rev. Rachel Vagado launched a six-week prayer study January 16 for those curious about prayer. Reimagining Prayer was held during the lunch hour in the Commons Prayer Room, a very appropriate environment for the subject. An opportunity to join the group via Zoom was also offered. A set of images by artist Schott Erickson helped explore some of the frustrations surrounding personal prayer practices. The group used this information to reframe how to enter into a deeper conversation with the Divine.

Church Retreat Held on Campus Feb 21-23 - Diana Butler Bass,



a renowned independent scholar of American religion and culture, was the featured guest speaker and leader of our three-day Annual Retreat held on our campus and opened to the community.

On Friday evening, guests had dinner in Davis Hall and then moved to the sanctuary to hear her keynote address where she introduced the theme

of the weekend, "Faith & the Common Good: How Empathy & Compassion Transforms Our World!" Those gathered had an opportunity to participate in vibrant discussions as part of the question and answer segment following her remarks.

Participants gathered on Saturday morning for breakfast in Davis Hall for the beginning of a workshop. Her remarks sparked energetic conversation conducted within small groups at each table and then table leaders summarized remarks from their table to all participants.

One topic of particular interest was how churches throughout the United States are taking a closer look at the use of their buildings which, for many hours throughout the week, stand empty. How can a church best use these spaces to serve the community and perhaps create income from their use to be used to benefit the mission outreach programs of the church?

On Sunday, February 23 Butler Bass preached a sermon entitled "Transfiguration of the Lord." Again, the community was invited to attend.

More than 100 people participated in the Annual Retreat. Several church members volunteered during the three days to direct traffic and assist with this special happening in the life of our church.

GIFT Sundays Planned - To encourage intergenerational learning, the Christian Formation Committee created a program to be held the fourth Sunday of each month called "GIFT Sundays." GIFT-Generations in Faith Together–Sundays brought our congregation together at 9:45 am for a light breakfast and was the only Sunday school offering that morning with all classes meeting together in Davis Hall. Designed to help us learn and grow in faith, this event was well attended and planned to occur throughout the year.

COVID STRIKES CHRISTIAN FORMATION PROGRAMS

Sunday School for Children - At the beginning of the 2020 calendar year, all Sunday school classes continued in place with commitment from church volunteers to teach and assist with youth pro-

grams. As the pandemic emerged, a decision was made in early March to shut down the campus and all related programs being held on the campus.

With leadership by Rev. Rachel Vagado and assistance from the Christian Education Committee, Rachel announced on March 29th a weekly virtual Sunday

school lesson would be offered during the regular Sunday school hour for all ages. She said, "Regardless of the pandemic, we will gather to connect, hear stories from and for our faith and learn together." These virtual lessons continued in the fall and in addition children were provided take-home kits each month and five-minute videos by Rachel each Sunday morning.

Adult Sunday School - For the four Sundays in May, the Journey Class began to meet by Zoom which would be followed by outdoor meetings during the summer and then in-person, safe meetings with masks and social distancing in the fall.

The S&D Class began Zoom meetings soon after the Journey Class which continued throughout 2020.

Journey Class meets in June.



A Creative Staycation Bible School held July 27-31

The Footsteps of Jesus was the theme of Vacation Bible School which earned the name "Staycation Bible School" due to those participating from the comfort and safety of their home. Another add-on was the advantage of participating while on vacation because of the kits prepared for the week. Kits included Bible stories, crafts, snacks and service ideas for the student and family to do together.

A daily video was delivered to their inbox each day of the week with the Bible story, as well as links to music and movement videos and songs. This was designed so that the parent could choose the time each day their child would watch the video and when to do the crafts and other explorations. Children attending were ages 4 through 5th grade. Families of the First Kids program were also offered a chance to enroll and kits were delivered by First Kids teachers to their homes.





Several youths from our church explored the struggles of those who are living on the margins within and around Asheville during the Youth Mission Weekend in February 2020. Their host was the Asheville Youth Mission which works with a variety of agencies working with the homeless, in poverty, or food insecurity.

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The Todd Hobbie Class suspended meeting until they were able to meet in person again.

Lenten Kits Prepared - Lenten kits for family worship at home were prepared. **They included special cards for inspirational study and candles** to be used during this time of reflection.

4th Graders Receive Bibles - As has long been the tradition of our church, 4th graders were presented a Bible from the church. This year, a photo of each child was shown as part of the YouTube church service. A member of the Christian Education Committee delivered the Bible to each 4th grader's home.

High School Seniors Remembered - Another tradition has been to have a reception for the graduating seniors. **This year clever care packets were delivered to the homes of these graduates.** During another You-Tube worship service, a special video was shown honoring these students sharing where each student was headed following graduation. Creative banners were posted on both Union St. and Church St. celebrating these graduates.

Rally Day Kicks Off New Church School Year in September - Rally Day was another virtual celebration. Via video, each Christian Education Committee member introduced what their respective areas had to offer and encouraged those interested to participate, despite Covid, another way to grow in faith and remain connected to the church family.

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First Kids Preschool Program by Maureen O'Bryan, Director

The year 2020 brought many dramatic changes to the world. Our goal at First Kids was to make sure our preschoolers and their families felt emotionally and academically supported as we learned to adapt to the Covid rollercoaster of changes.

On Friday, March 13, 2020 we, like the rest of the world, closed our school for in-person classes as mandated. We quickly rallied, and by the following Monday morning our staff was providing on-line virtual instruction for music, science, math, and

literacy and more. Take-home kits, Zoom meetings, supportive calls and driveby virtual hugs helped us all keep connected through the spring.

Our May graduation ceremony, which usually takes place in the sanctuary, was transformed into a Graduation Car Parade down Union Street, complete with fire trucks, police cars, banners, a string quartet and heart-warming cheers from our neighbors. Preschool parent Kelly McCar-

thy said, "That uplifting parade was a unifying event our whole neighborhood needed, something normal, some-

thing to cheer about during such a difficult time."

Over the past 64 years, over 2000 children have graduated from First Kids and crossed over the Graduation Bridge. In addition to the parade, the bridge was set up in the courtyard so the 2020 graduates were able to return, diplomas in hand, to have their photo made crossing the bridge.

We were able to re-open for in-person instruction in September, just in time to celebrate our 65th Birthday. The sheer joy and exuberance expressed by the children, parents and teachers, who were all so happy to be back, made all the cleaning, mask-wearing and temperature-taking worthwhile. "My children are ecstatic to be at First Kids. Even when it's not a school day for us, we ride by the building and they get excited," parent Caroline Jarvis chuckled.

Director Maureen O'Bryan said, "The challenges of 2020 have only served to strengthen our purpose and focus to provide sensory-rich, highlyintentional, early learning experiences in a loving and creative environment for the young children who are called First Kids. We are blessed to be an important mission of the First Presbyterian church as we grow minds and share God's love with the children of our community."

First Kids offers:

- Half-Day Classes for children ages 6 months through Transitional Kindergarten
- Highly-Trained staff with low student-to-teacher ratios
- Music and Movement Classes
- Monthly Chapel Experiences
- The Creative Curriculum Program with emphasis on hands-on, developmentally appropriate experiences
- Partnership with UNC Charlotte's Building Healthy Lifestyles Initiative

2020 THROUGH THE LENS OF **Presbyterian Women**

A Report by René Prager, Presbyterian Women Moderator 2020-2021

There is no pause button for Presbyterian Women; 2020 was a very busy year! Before the pandemic, our circles met for monthly Bible studies January through March. We hosted our Spring Spiritual Nurture event with the dynamic Jamie Valvano on March 8, 2020, as the last in-person gathering for the year.

During times of crisis, the work of Presbyterian Women increases, rather than takes a break. Thanks to Susan Brooks and our outstanding Backpack team, the families in need at Coltrane Webb did not miss a single week of food provisions. Betsy Morrison led our Night Shelter team through the Covid-prompted changes to our week-long dinner service in May. This included a dropoff dinner delivery instead of serving indoors and providing paper products to assist with safety protocols. These guidelines were followed in September and December.

Both the Funeral Meal and Meal Ministry teams made adjustments to how meals were delivered in 2020, but they were dedicated to providing meals to the sick or recovering, families of new babies, and those gathering for the loss of a loved one.

Our coordinating team worked throughout the summer to establish the annual budget, edit the directory, and attempt to plan the upcoming year. With the goal of returning in-person, we delayed the start of the year by one month, but it became evident that most of our meetings and gatherings would need to transition to a virtual forum.

In 2020, over 100 women participated in Presbyterian Women: as a circle member, coordinating team member, in fellowship, mission, or congregational care. We were excited to welcome a number of young adult women as active members of our organization this year.

Four circles resumed meeting in October: two in person and two via Zoom. Circle service projects included Rose of Thanks, local schools, CVAN, CCM, Santa on Wheels, and DHS.

A new card ministry for our older congregation members was established.

Presbyterian Women operated on its own budget of under \$5,000. No line item is in the church's annual budget for Presbyterian Women. Instead, our annual income is derived from pledges made directly to PW by women of the church. Many lives are touched by these contributions from this dedicated team of women, both within our congregation and throughout our community!

We were grateful for the support of the congregation, as well as for Lynne and Rachel for their meaningful participation in our special events, to Christy Cannup for keeping our financial records, to Suzanne Ritchie for her amazing contributions to our communication, and to Heath for ensuring that we had everything we needed for our in-person offerings.

Joy Gift Offering and Concert

The Christmas Joy Offering has been a Presbyterian Women tradition since the 1930's. The Offering is distributed equally to two areas of need: the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions, providing critical support to church workers and their families, and Presbyterian-related schools and colleges, providing education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage. The congregation donated \$1,743 for the Joy Gift Offering in 2020.

Since the traditional Joy Gift dinner and concert was cancelled due to the pandemic, an amazing collection of talents came together to create what we enjoyed as the virtual Joy Gift Concert of 2020! Our traditional dinner concert was beautifully



re-envisioned by Shirley Brannan and Nancy Chikes, coordinators for the annual event. A special thank you to Hunter Morrison and the entire Worship and Music Committee for their assistance and support in

creating a video version of this concert for us to enjoy throughout the season! This event is posted on the First Presbyterian YouTube site.

Special thanks to Rev. Rush Otey for his inspiring closing prayer, and Jacquie Yost and Jeff Price for directing and compiling the breathtaking arrangement of anthems and solos by our extraordinary Sanctuary Choir. Jacquie noted, "This concert was boldly prepared for your enjoyment in affirmation of Christ's presence with and within us during this season of Advent."

Spiritual Nurture Luncheon | Sunday, March 8th

The Spiritual Nurture Luncheon has been an annual traditional luncheon hosted by the Presbyterian Women for women of the church. The 2020 event featured motivational speaker Jamie Valvano, middle daughter of legendary NC State basketball coach Jim Valvano who died from cancer at the age of 47. Because of Jamie's personal background and reputation as a speaker, the luncheon was opened to the men of the church.

Jamie shared private and personal insights to inspire those attending about how to live an extraordinary life having experienced amazing victory and heartbreaking tragedy herself.

More than 100 people attended this motivational luncheon. A \$300 scholarship from the Dunford Fund was awarded by the Presbyterian Women who manage this fund to cover partial costs of the event. Additional funds to cover expenses came from the cost of the lunch and the sale of table arrangements at the end of the luncheon.



Kimberly Leatherman and Nicki Bryant luncheon coordinators noted, "Jamie is such an exceptional speaker we wanted to share her inspirational messages with as many as possible. We were delighted with the large attendance. She was a treat to hear and the feedback was outstanding!"

COLTRANE WEBB BACKPACK PROGRAM

Susan Brooks, Coordinator of the Presbyterian Women Backpack Program, discusses the creative 2020 approach to providing food to these students.

We share the Backpack Program with Central United Methodist Church, and together serve 30 students each week during the school year. During Covid, we could not continue to provide rolling bags of food due to factors such as bare shelves in the grocery stores, quantity limits on some items on our shopping lists, and the high degree of health risks our shoppers would face.

The school district asked us not to provide food in the rolling bags without going through some stringent disinfecting requirements every week. Then, the schools switched to providing virtual lessons for students which added an extra layer of complexity to providing actual food. Because we had been providing enough food to feed four people over the weekend, we had to shift quickly to continue supporting these needy families.

But first we had a pantry full of food that had already been purchased, so we decided to take that food to Cooperative Christian Ministy – all 1,600 pounds of it!

As we had already been providing Food Lion gift cards for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter, it made sense to switch to that method of support. The food we were provid-

ing averaged out to a little over \$23 per family per weekend. Providing a \$25 no tobacco/no alcohol gift card meant each family could replicate our weekly purchases if they chose, or they could combine the card with other available resources and purchase food we aren't able to provide, such as dairy, fresh fruits and vegetables.

This has been a year that has required a good deal of flexibility from everyone. And even though we had to change how we provided assistance, we are immensely proud

that we moved from providing food to providing gift cards without missing a single week. We will continue to meet whatever challenges arise. For the Presbyterian Women, the children must be fed.

First Pres International Mission Outreach in Haiti



In 2017 and 2018, several members of our congregation with Rev. Lynne Keel as the team leader participated in mission trips to support Operation Force for Christ Bayonnais (OFCB) in Haiti. The focus was to support Actionelle Fleurisma, founder of OFCB Ministries, who in 1993 started a school in the mountain region of Bayonnais, Haiti. This school now has a main campus and two satellite schools and, at one point served 2,500 students. A trip was planned for 2019, but was cancelled due to political unrest in Haiti.

HAITI 2020-AN UPDATE BY BETSY LILES

Life in Bayonnais continued in 2020 despite the civil unrest and Covid. Bayonnais was terribly affected by the political turmoil and the Covid virus. The country experienced starvation, burning tires, barricades with fire, gunfire and kidnappings. Food in Bayonnais was scarce, but fortunately rice was distributed to the students in each of the schools.

Faith, hard work and hope brought many good things to Bayonnais in 2020 as well.

Actionelle reported school attendance was very high with 1,700 students on the main campus and an additional 500 at the satellite campuses. The 9th graders took the National Exams and sixteen 13th graders graduated in the fall. 550 students were sponsored in 2020 through World of God with over 30 students being sponsored by members of First Presbyterian Church. There are still 1,650 students that are unsponsored. (See below to sponsor a child.)

Agronomy in Bayonnais remained strong and their chicken operation produced 90-100 eggs per day. The medical clinic saw more patients in 2020 than in previous years and continues to do all they can to meet the health care needs of their community.

NAME CHANGE AND NEW AMBULANCE

OFCB officially changed its name to Friends Empowering Haiti with the tagline, "A Mission of Love and Hope for Bayonnais." Friends has a strong board of directors that meets monthly and is supported financially by numerous churches in North and South Carolina. First Pres members Brian Moore and Betsy Liles serve on this board. Friends sponsored a Facebook Fundraiser in the fall which raised \$22,000 for our friends in Haiti!

An ambulance was donated to Friends. Ambulances are very scarce in the Bayonnais area and in much need, thus the new ambulance will be a tremendous source of help. Board members drove the ambulance to Florida and it was then shipped to Haiti.

Although travel to Haiti was halted in 2020, our church's relationship with Bayonnais remains strong. Hope abounds and our church stands ready to travel to Haiti as soon as it is safe to do so!

First Pres Becomes a Matthew 25 Congregation

The Matthew 25 Invitation - Matthew 25:31-46 calls all of us to actively engage in the world around us, so our faith comes alive, and we awaken to new possibilities within the Kingdom of God. Convicted by this passage, both the 222nd and 223rd General Assemblies (2016 and 2018) exhorted our denomination's churches to act boldly and compassionately to serve those who are marginalized or in need – people who are hungry, thirsty, naked, sick, imprisoned, strangers, poor or oppressed in other ways and in need of welcoming and healing.

Our Session Responds - Responding to the rising rates of poverty as well as the increasing racial tensions in our community, First Concord's Session voted to become a Matthew 25 congregation in June of 2020. This denominational initiative seeks to focus on three areas: 1) Building congregational vitality, 2) Dismantling structural racism, and 3) Eradicating systemic poverty.



Rev. Lynne Keel said, "By making this commitment, we have united with Presbyterians across the country who are studying and addressing these areas of focus. Our congregation began this process in 2020 by creating a Racial Equity Reads group to educate ourselves about the role of structural racism in our country, community, and American Christianity.

ally, our Diaconate has added an Anti-Racism

liaison, currently represented by Scott Verner, to explore how our congregation may work to dismantle structural racism. We look forward to expanding these efforts churchwide as well as introducing additional programming related to poverty eradication."

Scott Verner noted, "What I have learned over the past year is that systemic racism is not the open bigotry expressed by someone shouting a racial slur. Instead, it is the assumptions behind racism that have been woven into American systems over the past 400 years – education, justice, economics, health care and more.

"It harms minorities deeply every single day. It holds power over us all, and it works in ways that many of us dismiss or aren't aware of. That's because we don't understand how it arose, we haven't been taught our 'whole' history, and we don't see how our systems harm minorities. I believe we all must open ourselves to truly see systemic racism for what it is - an abomination that continues to blind us to racial inequity."



Technology Upgrade Helpful - As we adjusted to a church living in the midst of a pandemic, our Christian Formation programs became dependent on technology to deliver these programs to our church family. This ranged from the church service, the Sunday school classes, Session and Diaconate meetings, Music Ministry presentations, and to church committee meetings. **The Christian Education Committee recommended to the Session that we purchase new equipment and greater internet speed** so we could establish a strong delivery system of information to our congregation which the Session approved.

Virtual Christmas Pageant - Rev. Rachel Vagado with assistance from her husband Chris, minister of New Hope Presbyterian Church, Gastonia, and Jason Graffis, Director of Contemporary Worship and Arts at Covenant Presbyterian Church, Charlotte, produced a virtual Christmas pageant. The video was a salute to actual pageants from years gone by that included video footage and photos collected from church families. Youth read the Christmas story and familiar Christmas carols were sung by a soloist creating a nostalgic look at the church's traditional pageants.
